

LETTER TO THE VILLAGE MAYOR, BOARD OF TRUSTEES, BUSINESS COMMUNITY AND RESIDENTS

To the Village Mayor, Board of Trustees, Business Community and Residents of the Village of Willowbrook.

I am pleased to respectively present to you the 2013 Annual Report. This year we experienced several very positive additions to the Police Department. Three new officers were hired to replace past reductions in the department. Also, two Sergeant promotions were approved and two officers were promoted to the rank of Sergeant. The promotions replaced two vacant positions. The department currently has (22) sworn officers.

The department incurred a slight increase in calls for service, which increased by (549) incidents, and a reduction in criminal incidents, which decreased by (284) incidents. This may be attributed to a concentration and high visibility assignments throughout the neighborhoods and businesses by the officers.

The traffic accident summary also has shown a reduction compared to 2012. Total accidents were reduced by (114). Personal Injury accidents were reduced by (22) and Property Damage accidents were reduced by (52).

As Chief I have received numerous calls from homeowners and business owners relating how the officers have went out of their way to be of assistance. The men and women of the department continue to be attentive to the needs of the Village and safety of its residents. I believe it is only through the unwavering support of our Village Mayor, Village Board and Village Administrator that the police department is able to continue the professionalism and excellence of service expected.







Officers are able to make status changes utilizing different computer code changes in their in-car Mobile Data Terminals (MDT). By using the MDT's officers keep the radio traffic to a minimum and change their daily status activities without having dispatch numbers created which allow dispatchers to stay vigilant with other radio traffic.









CANINE

The Willowbrook K-9 Unit is made up by Officer Dave Gaddis and his partner Icha. They also assist with the Felony Investigative Assistance Team (FIAT). Officer Gaddis is also the Assistant K-9 Coordinator.

The K-9 Unit conducted (206) hours of training. The K-9 Unit was involved and coordinates searches involving F.I.A.T. (Felony Investigative Assistance Team) in various neighboring towns which resulted in the recovery of evidence to assist in the prosecution of felony crimes. The K-9 Unit had (4) offender tracks that resulted in the apprehension of the suspects. The K-9 Unit assisted the D.E.A. and NARCINT with investigations which led to the seizure of U.S. Currency and asset forfeiture proceedings. There were numerous searches, seven of which were vehicle searches that led to the discovery of hidden contraband and drug paraphernalia, subsequently leading to arrests.

The Willowbrook K-9 Unit has conducted various community demonstrations which are always positively received and greatly appreciated. Icha assists neighboring departments, when available, which keeps her vigilant in her trained specialties. Icha has proven to be a valuable resource to the community.

Sustained The investigation disclosed sufficient evidence to clearly prove the allegation made in the complaint.

Unfounded The investigation found that the allegation did not occur or failed to involve department personnel.

Exonerated The allegation did occur, but the acts were justified, lawful and proper.

Suspended The investigation failed to reveal, after all known leads have been exhausted, the identity of or the involvement of a department member, in any part of the allegation; but there still remains a possibility that with new evidence, the allegation can be substantiated.

Policy Failure The investigation revealed the acts did occur; however the employee was acting in accordance with established department policy.

CADET PROGRAM

In March the Cadets assisted with traffic control and security at Gower Middle School for their Fun Fair. On St. Patrick's Weekend the Cadets helped with St. Baldrick's Celebration by setting up the silent auction table and selling raffles tickets. On the final weekend in March the Cadets assisted the Willowbrook Park District with the Easter Egg Hunt at Borse Community Park. In June the Cadets attended the Hinsdale Humane Society's Pet Walk dressed as McGruff and were a big hit with the kids. In June and July the Cadets assisted the Police Department by covering the front desk on the afternoon shift due to staff shortages. The Cadets answered the telephones and assisted any citizens that had come to the Police Department with questions.

In August the Cadets attended the Law Enforcement Explorer Conference in Springfield. The Cadets competed in several events and took second place in Criminal Surveillance. On the first day of the conference the Cadets were given an aptitude test that covered Math, English and some criminal justice questions. Tim Breslin took third place out of 200 competing Cadets. The Cadets also received recognition for their outstanding team work. Officer Volek attended the conference with the Cadets and received several compliments on the Cadets' professionalism and how well they interacted with other Cadets from different posts.

In August the Cadets also passed out crime prevention and awareness flyers in the neighborhoods where criminal activity had occurred. During Halloween the Cadets passed out glow sticks to the children trick or treating. In November the Cadets assisted the Detective Division with undercover Tobacco buys. In December the Cadets assisted the Willowbrook Park District with the Tree Lighting Ceremony at Willow Pond.

During the year the Cadets received 84 hours of training on a variety of criminal justice topics. They assisted the police department with over 80 hours of administrative duties including, stuffing envelopes, monitoring the front desk, and assisting the secretaries with some of their duties.

Our technicians assisted with many installations and actually installed 52 child passenger safety seats during 2013.

Over (120) seniors attended and enjoyed a fun-filled afternoon of bingo, good fellowship and snacks.
